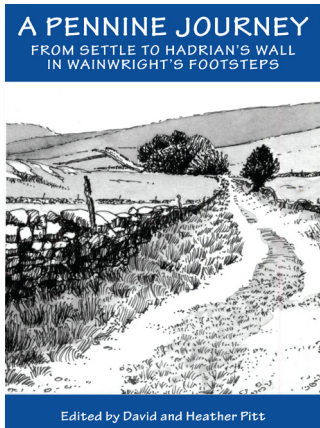
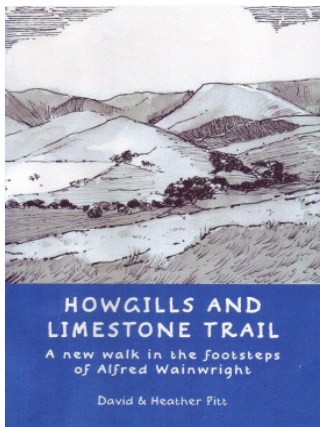




Pennine Journey Book Order Form



A Pennine Journey in September 1938, A. Wainwright made a solitary walk through the Pennines. The following year he wrote up an account of this walk, which was eventually published as A Pennine Journey in 1986. This pictorial guide is a re-creation of his walk taking a route that Wainwright might have chosen if he was planning it today. The route is 247 miles long and with maps and illustrations inspired by the work of the great AW & this labour of love is essential for all those who wish to follow in Wainwright's footsteps.



The Howgills and Limestone Trail is a new 76 mile long distance walk from Kirkby Stephen to Settle through a picturesque area of Cumbria and North Yorkshire - with a short diversion into Lancashire. The Trail takes its inspiration from Wainwright's Walks on the Howgill Fells and Walks in Limestone Country and is a worthy sequel to A Pennine Journey. It can be linked with the final stages of the Pennine Journey between Kirkby Stephen to Settle to form a 134 mile circular walk.

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
